



Research and Action in the New South Africa: Study Abroad in South Africa this summer with the African American and African Studies Program.

African and African American Studies is offering Research and Action in the New South Africa Summer 2017. This course will be offered as AAAS 893c, 890, 490, & 390. The program will run from May 19 to June 23, 2017.

This program will provide a unique international internship/service-learning and field research development course experience in South Africa. Students will be immersed in real life contexts where they will directly examine, explore and engage the African World lived-experience in practice. The country provides a dynamic site for examining the intersections of race, identity and

historical legacies that inform the country's current rapidly transformational political, cultural and economic structures.

Graduate and advanced Undergraduate students will engage in internship/service-learning activities with non-governmental and secondary educational partners. Partnering with the University of South Africa (UNISA) and other institutions, students will have the

opportunity to conduct advanced field research (undergrads and grads) or pre-dissertation research (grads). Students will have the opportunity to work with South African communities in Pretoria,

Johannesburg, Soweto, and Venda and engage in important cultural, economic development and social justice initiatives.

Bioethics Brownbag and Webinar Series

"Covert Costs of Racial and Ethnic Concordance in the Medical Workforce," January 18, 12:00-1:00pm, East Fee Hall, C102 Patenge Room.

Over the past century US medical workforce demographics have shifted. Moving away from a white male dominated profession, there is a welcomed push towards increasing gender, ethnic, racial, and linguistic representation. That shift is accompanied by policy initiatives and rhetoric shaping the professional futures of underrepresented minority (URM) physicians. Do these policy initiatives carry social costs that inadvertently influence URM's futures in the medical workforce?

2017 Richard Lee Featherstone Endowed Prize

The Richard Lee Featherstone Endowed Prize seeks to identify the most outstanding graduating senior, based on the criteria below, and to grant an award to be used for "future growth and development, travel, graduate study, or meditation," to quote one of the Prize founders, Gerald Faverman. In 2017, the amount awarded will be \$4,000.

Selection Criteria

- 1. The award recipient must be a Michigan State University senior, majoring in any discipline, who is expected to graduate during 2017 (Spring, Summer, or Fall).
- 2. The award recipient will exhibit an open, curious, creative approach to education and ideas, and intellectual ingenuity will be evident. More weight will be given to intellectual curiosity and innovation than to grades

attained, although a cumulative GPA above 3.0 is preferred.

3. The award recipient will have demonstrated exceptional character and leadership in furthering her/his own progress and in enriching the lives of others, especially in intellectual and international dimensions. She/he will have utilized innovative approaches in these efforts. A commitment to community service and to lifelong learning should be evident.

Nomination Procedure

There is no formal nomination or application form. Each nomination packet should include:

- * One letter of nomination from a Michigan State University faculty or academic staff member and up to two additional letters in support of the nomination from Michigan State University faculty or academic staff members (includes advisors). Letters should be addressed to the Featherstone Nomination Committee, 312 Administration Building.
- * An essay or letter of not more than 1,000 words written by the student. The student's name, MSU Net ID, address, and telephone number must be included on the student's submission.
- * Student's resume (not to exceed 2 pages)

Nelson Mandela Museum/MSU Museum Curatorial Fellowship MSU Museum and The Graduate School Summer/Fall 2017

The Nelson Mandela Museum/Michigan State University Museum Curatorial Fellowship Programis one of many MSU programs that help meet post-apartheid South Africa's challenge to document, preserve, and interpret history and expressive culture. The NMMMSUMCFPsprings from a history of two museums (Michigan State University Museum and the Nelson Mandela Museum) working together and independently on similar activities and the desire of both institutions to work on new projects that further their respective missions.

Curatorial fellowship projects will be conducted during the summer and fall semesters. Ten weeks of the summer semester will be spent in South Africa (with at least eight weeks working full-time at the Mandela Museum based in Mthatha) and the following fall semester will be spent working part-time at the MSU Museum. Curatorial fellows will be expected to plan and complete projects in collaboration with and mentored by MSU faculty and professional museum staff at each institution. Projects must reflect the educational and research missions of the two museums, address identified needs of the museums, ideally incorporate technology, and be in compliance with international standards of museum practice. Special emphasis is given to projects that demonstrate the spirit of ubuntu, the traditional South African humanist philosophy focusing on people's allegiances and relations with each other.

Each fellow will receive \$16,000. Up to an additional \$500 will be available to attend a cultural heritage conference in South Africa and up to an additional \$1000 will be available to cover travel and conference registration costs to present the results of fellowship experience or work to a professional or academic meeting in the U.S.

Applicants should be enrolled full-time in a program leading to a terminal degree that is normally understood as a prerequisite for academic jobs (usually a Ph.D.), be in good academic standing, and making progress on their degrees. Applicants must have taken, minimally, the Foundations of Museum Studies course at MSU (or completed a comparable course or had curatorial experience at a museum).

Applicants should submit the attached application form; a C.V.; and a brief essay that describes their career goals, why they are interested in NMMMSUMGC, and how they anticipate that participation in NMMMSUMGC will enhance their professional development. Applications must be submitted on or before Friday, February 27, 2017. Announcements of the fellowship recipient will be made by March 31, 2017.
