

International Studies and Programs (ISP) Student Funding Opportunities

Deadline: March 1, 2017

In an effort to continue to internationalize the student experience, ISP takes pride in helping to support students who are interested in working on the world's greatest problems. Here are some internationally focused funding opportunities, administered by the ISP Dean's office, for undergraduate and graduate students.

Claffey Meyer International Travel Grant (doc)

This award provides financial assistance to domestic students who intend to travel to developing countries for the purpose of providing technical assistance, participate in research, or engage in service. The intent is for students to work towards discovering and implementing solutions in response to urgent human needs (for example: food security, environmental quality, health and nutrition, education, and other areas) and, thereby, to encourage careers in international development teaching, research and practice. Grants are intended to support travel, related living expenses, and projects costs, not to be used as a tuition scholarship.

David D. Horner International Student Scholarship Fund

A scholarship fund reserved for international students in financial distress due to circumstances beyond their control, which may jeopardize students' ability to remain at MSU.

Dr. Charles and Marjorie Gliozzo Dissertation Research Scholarship

This scholarship is available to MSU doctoral students with dissertation research objectives who have defended, or are in the process of defending, a dissertation proposal. The scholarship supports field research abroad in support of the student's dissertation.

Office of the Vice President for Research and Graduate Studies Discretionary Funding Initiative (DFI)

Deadline: March 2, 2017

The Discretionary Funding Initiative (DFI), funded by the Michigan State University Foundation, provides bridge funds for tenure stream faculty for additional studies needed for resubmission of an unsuccessful, but nearly fundable, grant application to the same funding agency. To request funding from this program, faculty should submit a request to the research associate dean of their college (lead college, if appointed in multiple colleges) using the DFI information form attached to this email. Applicants will be expected to provide copies of their previous external reviews, if applicable, and describe the work that will be completed to address the comments provided in these documents.

Requests for support approved by the research associate deans will be forwarded to the Office of the Vice President for Research and Graduate Studies in a prioritized list. The maximum award from the OVPRGS will be \$25K and will require a 100% (up to \$25K) match from units or colleges. The PIs of the recommended projects will be required to submit an electronic transmittal. Funds will be available for 18 months, and an activity report will be required at the end of the granting period.

March 2, 2017 Deadline for applicants to submit applications to their college.

March 30, 2017 Deadline for Research Associate Deans to submit applications to the OVPRGS. Applications

must be sent to proposal@msu.edu no later than 5pm.

April 6, 2017 E-transmittal must be finalized for applications that were sent to the OVPRGS for

consideration.

May 4, 2017 Funding announcements will be made.

Research Grant

The Association for the Study of the Middle East and Africa (ASMEA) is offering the following Grant Opportunities in conjunction with the Tenth Annual ASMEA Conference on October 19 - 21, 2017 in Washington, D.C.

Research Grants

ASMEA is offering research grants of up to \$2500 to qualified professors and students engaged in the study of the Middle East and Africa. Applications must be accompanied by a paper proposal that represents new and unpublished research and is relevant to the qualifying research areas designated by ASMEA. Successful research grant applicants are required to present their research at the Tenth Annual ASMEA Conference and provide ASMEA the right of first refusal for potential publication in our peer-reviewed Journal of the Middle East and Africa.

To stimulate new and diverse lines of discourse about the Middle East and Africa, ASMEA's Research Grants Program seeks to support research on topics that deserve greater attention. The topic areas and sub-topics listed below are intended as a guide for potential participants in the program and constitute the types of subjects that ASMEA intends to support. An applicant may submit a proposal on any topic as long as it is directly relevant to the five broad areas outlined and constitutes new and original research: Status of Minorities and Women, Modern Military History, Governance and Economy, Belief, and Personal Status.

Travel Grants

ASMEA is offering travel grants to qualified scholars and students whose paper proposals are accepted for presentation at the Tenth Annual ASMEA Conference. Grants of up to \$750 are available for international applicants while U.S. applicants may receive grants of up to \$500.

Center for Advanced Study of International Development International Strategic Partnership Funding

Deadline: March 1, 2017

The Provost and Associate Provost and Dean of ISP have made funding available to develop international strategic partnerships with universities and institutions of higher education and research abroad. The funding is focused on the international themes of food and agriculture, environment, health and nutrition, and education. These partnerships should involve MSU faculty from multiple disciplines and fields of study. Collaborations focused on these international themes that involve faculty from Arts and Letters or Social Science are encouraged. Partnerships should center on collaborative research, including proposal development and preliminary research activities that build institutional capacity and strengthen the institutional partnership.

Strategic partnerships should ultimately lead to potential long-term research and other collaborations between MSU and the partner institution. Grant development can be facilitated by CASID staff in collaboration with involved units. Funding may be granted for continued support to develop these partnerships, depending on the outcomes of the initial grant.

Call for Abstracts

Research is fundamental to the development process of Africa. It plays a key role in informing development interventions in every sector. Yet, the relationship between researchers and decision makers is not without tension and has been a subject of considerable debate, with a focus on how research can better influence policy makers and how policy makers can use good research to inform development interventions. We recognize the real potential of research to promote emergence of new ideas and skills for their dissemination to inform formulation of effective policies for development. It is in this light that this second AGSA Annual Research Conference seeks to provide a platform for creating new ideas to the larger thematic orientation and promotes proactive dialogue among researchers, decision makers and civil society stakeholders. The main purpose is to share ideas arising from research conducted by graduate students working on African issues, and deliberate on ways to create and strengthen networks among researchers, decision makers and civil society.

Therefore, the AGSA is calling for abstracts from all African MSU students and Africanists, from different disciplines, conducting research in Africa.

Submission guidelines - Abstracts are invited from completed studies, works in progress, and social ventures. You are required to show how your research aligns to the theme. As this will be a multidisciplinary conference, presenters are urged to put emphasis on the significance and impact of their research in their respective study areas and addressing the problem(s) of focus. Abstracts should be a maximum of 250 words and should include the broader problem in which the research is situated. Also indicate whether you are submitting for an oral or poster presentation, both of which are given equal recognition.

All submitted abstracts will be subject to a blind peer review process and authors will be notified of abstract acceptance by March 2, 2017.

The <u>ASA Presidential Fellows Program</u> provides opportunities for academics and practitioners with a scholarly interest in Africa to travel to the U.S. to attend the ASA Annual Meeting, visit institutions of higher learning in the United States, engage with academics working on Africa-related issues, and more. Deadline for nominations: March 20.

The <u>Melville J. Herskovits Prize</u> is awarded to the author of the most important scholarly work in African studies published in English during the preceding year. Deadline for nominations: April 30. Please note-Nomination letters must be received by the Secretariat by April 30 and all review copies of the publications need to be post-marked by the same date.

The <u>Bethwell A. Ogot Book Prize</u> is awarded to the author of the best book on East African Studies published in the previous calendar year. Deadline for nominations: April 30. Please note - Nomination letters must be received by the Secretariat by April 30 and all review copies of the publications need to be post-marked by the same date.

The <u>Distinguished Africanist Award</u> recognizes a lifetime of distinguished contributions to African studies. Deadline for nominations: April 30.

The <u>Graduate Student Paper Prize</u> is awarded to the best graduate student paper presented at the previous year's Annual Meeting. Deadline for nominations: April 30.

The <u>Paul Hair Prize</u> recognizes the best critical edition or translation into English of primary source materials on Africa published during the preceding two years. Deadline for nominations: April 30.

The <u>Gretchen Walsh Book Donation Award</u> offers an annual grant program to assist book donation projects with shipping costs to send books to African libraries and schools. Deadline for nominations: April 30.

The <u>Royal Air Maroc-ASA Student Travel Award</u> is granted to students to facilitate and increase the movement of students and the exchange of ideas, between students of African Studies in Africa and the United States. The overarching aim of the award is to acknowledge outstanding scholarship by future African Studies scholars. Deadline for nominations: April 30.
